

Ulek Mayang is traditionally performed by seven female dancers, dressed as princesses while three to four male dancers perform the role of the fishermen and 'bomoh'. In this ritual performance, the male dancers fall into a trance until they are restored by a true 'bomoh'.

Although the ritual aspects of the dance are seldom performed nowadays — except very rarely in certain coastal villages of Terengganu — the Ulek Mayang still possesses one of the most haunting melodies and dance gestures among the folk traditions here. Many believed that the song itself is an old invocation uttered to summon sea spirits so a sense of mystery and magic remains even without the ritual itself.



SMART DEVICES THAT HELP CAREGIVERS FROM AFAR

A survey found that three out of four people aged 50 and older want to (0) stay in their homes and communities as they age. Smart-home technology, with devices powered by voice control, artificial intelligence (AI), and smart sensors, (9) B making it safer to age at home, while keeping caregivers informed.

"Technology is getting better, easier to use, (10) B, and better tailored to the needs of older adults and their caregivers," says Majd Alwan, Senior Vice President of Technology and Business Strategy for *LeadingAge*, an association of non-profit providers of aging services.

The new care app "BrioCare", equipped (11) D voice control via Amazon's Alexa, is geared to seniors aging alone. Along with curated content, video chats, and photo sharing, they get disease-specific tips, spoken medication reminders and refill alerts, and can tell their smart speaker if there's an emergency. (12) _____ a mobile app, a family member can program reminders for appointments, medication, and daily routines, or personal messages in their own voices.

Smart, connected home devices including thermostats, light bulbs, and faucets can be controlled via voice command or mobile app. A smart smoke and carbon monoxide (13) C will not only notify an older adult by voice or alarm, but also send smartphone alerts to caregivers and can even connect with other smart devices to unlock doors or (14) A lights.

Moreover, home sensors (15) C around the house can alert family caregivers to a health issue. For example, if a sensor in the refrigerator hasn't (16) B activated all day, it could be a sign that a house member hasn't eaten or isn't feeling well. Eric Giuliani has a motto after spending three years making his way around the world. Anything is possible. "I started this dream with no camera, no photography experience, no writing experience," he says. "I didn't have a travel blog or social media following. I didn't know how it was going to work financially because I didn't have enough money for long-term travel. "The most important thing in life is to figure out what your dream is. It's the hardest step of all."

Giuliani's dream was to leave his Miami-based corporate career behind and rediscover his purpose in life through a global odyssey that would take him to each continent. He spent a year learning photography, filmmaking and writing before embarking on an adventure in which he would try to exchange his marketing skills for lodging while using only buses, trains and ships to get from place to place. The highs and lows of the adventure are documented in a book that Giuliani released in spring 2021: *Sky's the Limit: One Man's 70,000-Mile Journey Around the World*.

The journey started on September 3, 2014, in one of Giuliani's favourite countries: South Africa. The trip got off to a smooth start, as some hotels agreed to Giuliani's photos-and-videos-for-lodging trade. Giuliani was also taking daily photos and starting a travel blog. Nevertheless, struggles began as Giuliani and his travel companion, Naomi, attempted to make their way through Mozambique, Malawi and Tanzania. Buses were hot and cramped, passports were missing the proper stamps, and money was lost.

Eric Giuliani isn't ready to give up traveling: He still would like to visit hard-to-reach islands. "I am a little over the solo traveling," he says. "If I travel any further, I hope to share it with someone else." Parting ways with Naomi didn't make matters any easier, as Giuliani then endured more long rides on run-down buses through the desert, took a wild motorcycle ride to pick up a travel visa, and evaded crime and terrorism in places such as Kenya, Uganda, and Ethiopia.

Giuliani opens up emotionally in the book, sharing that he struggled with whether he could continue the journey without Naomi. These struggles played a role in his later travels when he pursued her in places such as Siberia and China. Whether it was the desert cities of Africa or riding a train with Syrian refugees, Giuliani stood out — thanks to being 6'10, 260 pounds.

"It's a factor on those buses because I don't fit," the former Binghamton University basketball player says. "It's a pain to sit in a bus seat for 15 hours because you don't physically fit. But it's a bonus when you're walking around and people gravitate toward you because you are 6'10. It opens doors — being tall is a natural conversation starter — especially in other countries."

Giuliani's journey continued to take him to places such as Vietnam, Australia, Indonesia and North and South America. But the travel experiences, while memorable, were often lonely and alone. The trip came full circle, though, when he received the opportunity to board a small, old ship headed to his final continent: Antarctica. "Just the magic of being able to barter my way there was truly a miracle. **There were no holes in the story: I went to all seven continents.**"

Even more meaningful was the camaraderie that developed with his shipmates. When Giuliani set foot on the ice-covered continent, he did it with a group of fellow travel lovers and newfound international friends. "The stars aligned with this incredible group of human beings," he says. "The travel is one thing, but to experience it and share it with others was the missing piece — especially in a remote place like Antarctica."

The trip came to an end in London in early August 2017. Giuliani spent the next three years compiling his travel blogs and doing additional writing. *Sky's the Limit: One Man's 70,000-Mile Journey Around the World* can be purchased in paperback or Kindle format at amazon.com.

The Swedish climate activist Greta Thunberg has become known globally for her environmental campaign. In August 2018, aged 15, Thunberg began a solo climate protest by striking from school. 27 E A global strike in March drew more than a million people, however, in September it reached at least 4 million. 28 A

Her protests were inspired by US students who staged walkouts to demand better gun controls in response to multiple school shootings. Veteran climate activists have expressed surprise at how much impact Thunberg has had on public awareness in such a short time. 29 D Speaking at the United Nations climate conference in December 2018, she berated world leaders for behaving like irresponsible children.

Born in Stockholm in January 2003, her mother is Malena Ernman, who gave up her international career as an opera singer because of the climate effects of aviation. Her father, Svante Thunberg, is an actor. Greta has Asperger syndrome, which has, her father says, in the past affected her health. 30 C

She has attracted criticism, particularly from right-wing commentators, who claim she is too young or naive to know what she is talking about and is being manipulated by her parents. 31 B She has rebutted these criticisms and shown that she can live her low-carbon values with a vegan diet and by sailing to New York, rather than flying.

In September 2019 she condemned world leaders in an emotional speech at the UN, telling them: "You have stolen my dreams and my childhood with your empty words." On one occasion she crossed paths with the US president, Donald Trump. 32 G He tweeted mockingly: "She seems like a very happy young girl looking forward to a bright and wonderful future." Thunberg turned around the jibe by adopting it as her Twitter bio.
