



The country of LabaLaba is known for many things: its beaches, its food, its happy people, and of course, its elephants. The northern part of LabaLaba is famous for numerous camps, which tourists can visit to interact with the animals. However, there are two drastically different types of camps in the country: those built for entertaining tourists, and those built for saving elephants. The latter are typically called sanctuaries, as they usually take care of animals that have been ill-treated at tourist camps.

Even before these tourist camps became popular, elephants suffered at the hands of humans in LabaLaba and all over Asia. According to the Laba Elephant Conservation Centre, elephants were often used for logging until the government banned the practice. Local farmers would force elephants to pull heavy logs for long distance, resulting in many animal injuries and sometimes even deaths. When it became illegal to use elephants for logging, some turned to other industries to abuse these animals. Locals used them to track down endangered species such as tigers and panthers. Elephants became extremely popular in tourism, as visitors from around the world are charmed by animals they normally do not get to see.

Elephant trainers or mahouts can make large sums of money by offering elephant rides or teaching their elephants to do complex tricks. Paintings by elephants became very popular around 2008, when a video was posted online of a baby elephant using its trunk to hold a paintbrush and paint strokes across a blank canvas. Camps around LabaLaba began to train their own elephants to do the same, resulting in the increased misuse of the gentle animal. The Conservation Centre wildlife officer says that there are still many elephants working in the tourism industry.

Nevertheless, not all tourist camps mistreat their elephants. Most tourist camps offer elephant rides to adults and their kids but those that care for the animals properly do not put a seat on the elephant's back. The seat, typically made from wood, can badly harm the animal's back if not fitted properly and worn for long periods of time. One sanctuary in northern LabaLaba called BoonBoon treats elephants that have been hurt by these "taxi seats", which had caused their backs to swell. Some elephants were forced to wear a taxi seat for twenty hours a day.

A short documentary was produced which exposed the practices used to capture and tame elephants in LabaLaba. Even today, some elephant trainers practice "phajaan", which means breaking the spirit of the baby elephant so that it obeys and follows orders in the camps. Some say that the practice originated centuries ago from the belief that the elephant's wild spirit could be separated from its body to leave behind a tame and calm animal for the mahouts. Many animal activists equate *phajaan* with torture. Viewers who had seen the videos of this practice are extremely unhappy because they estimate that only one in three elephants survives the process of *phajaan*.

In a new light, sanctuaries all over Asia are making significant progress in protecting the rights of elephants. Most importantly, they work to spread awareness about the dangers and threats elephants go through in that part of the world. This encourages tourists to decide wisely which camps or sanctuaries to visit and promote.
