
A sizzling all-Malaysian final in the Arctic Open

The Sharing Economy
Look around at the things we have purchased at some point in our lives. (27) Among the things are the smartphone that has been put away as we upgraded to the latest model, the car that is only used on the weekends, and even the guest room in our house that has somehow been turned into a storeroom. Those underused assets may appear useless to some, yet they could be useful to others.
With the advent of the internet, online communities have discovered a method to generate incomes from the sharing of underutilised assets. Websites and social media groups are used to facilitate the buying and selling of second-hand goods. It is also now easier than ever to engage in peer-to-peer sharing activities. (28)
The widespread use of online platforms presents opportunities for consumers to earn quick money. For instance, working parents previously might have abandoned the idea of selling their children's outgrown clothes and old equipment. (29) However, online marketplaces have made it easier for parents to sell unused items and put some cash back into their pockets.
Businesses have also acknowledged the profitability of the sharing economy. (30) A business model that is gaining popularity allows companies to provide digital platforms which put customers in contact with individuals who can provide a particular product or service. Companies like Airbnb act as a middleman for homeowners to cash in on their unused rooms or houses by renting them out as accommodations. (31)
The shift towards a sharing economy is not without criticism. Unregulated individuals, unlike corporations, are not required to obey certain regulations.(32) Nevertheless, living in the consumer society at present, the greater chances to sell our unwanted and underused goods could result in lower environmental impact which is definitely advantageous to our overall well-being.
