Bill Sumiel was having a tough Friday. It was October 2020, and the 71-year-old, who was dealing with kidney failure and had been on dialysis for a few years, found himself at a Vascular centre 30 miles from home for the second time in 24 hours. The day before, his brother had driven him to the Vascular Institute in Vineland, New Jersey, where he had undergone a routine procedure to clear a blockage in his dialysis access port, but unexpectedly, it became clogged again later that night.

Bill was no stranger to the struggles of kidney disease. He had been diagnosed with diabetes more than 20 years earlier, which led to his kidney problems. He was on the transplant list, but no matches had yet appeared. So, he continued with his treatments, including the periodic port that had failed this time. Without a ride for Friday's second trip, Bill took an Uber to and from his appointment.

Timothy Letts, 31, was driving north to visit a friend when his phone pinged with a request for Bill's ride home. The trip was out of Tim's way. Still, he accepted the fare, thinking the passenger might need help since he was coming from a medical facility. When Bill got into the car, Tim noticed that the older man was **lethargic** but cheerful. As they set out on the 40-minute drive to Bill's home in Salem, they began chatting.

Tim said that Bill lit up the car with positive energy. He told Bill he was a proud Army veteran. Bill, who worked in sales at a company that made piping, said he had once enjoyed volunteering at church and in his community and had even served as president of the city council. But now, the dialysis treatments left him too exhausted to do much. Then Bill mentioned that he was searching for a kidney donor. Tim joked that he might be a good donor since he didn't drink or smoke. The man agreed but didn't take the comment seriously. However, Tim couldn't stop thinking about it. He believed in helping others, and donating a kidney was something that had always been on his mind and now, he already

liked and respected Bill. About a quarter mile from Bill's house, Tim said he would like to see if he could be a match to give Bill a kidney.

Bill recalled, chuckling, that he was shocked. He was shaking so much he could hardly write his name when they exchanged contact information. When he got home, he excitedly told his wife that the Uber driver had just offered him his kidney. After the excitement wore off, Bill felt less sure. He was touched by Tim's offer, but he wondered if it was just said in the moment. Would he hear from him again? And what were the chances they would be a match?

But Tim kept his promise. He got in touch with Bill just a few hours later. By the next week, he had contacted the kidney transplant program. After a long **screening** process—including an interview, sharing medical records, meeting a donor advocate, and medical testing—doctors confirmed that Tim was an ideal donor and a perfect match for Bill. On December 7, 2021, 14 months after they met randomly in an Uber, both men underwent their surgeries. The transplant was a success. Today, Bill is doing well, working full-time from home, and spending time with his family—no more dialysis. Tim later moved to Germany to work with the Army's Family and Morale, Welfare and Recreation department as a civilian. He and Bill still keep in touch and look forward to meeting again someday. Bill is especially excited. He often says that living donors are special people.

Puteri Saadong and the Journey of Sacrifice

In the rich historical landscape of Kelantan, one name stands out as a symbol of grace, wisdom, and sacrifice—Puteri Saadong. She was the daughter of Raja Loyor of Jembal and the adopted heir of the legendary queen, Che Siti Wan Kembang. Raised within the royal court, she was well-educated in state affairs, traditional healing, and the arts. Upon reaching maturity, she married Raja Abdullah and ascended as queen. 27

Under their rule, Kelantan flourished economically and culturally. 28 Viewing Kelantan as a potential threat, the Siamese king demanded regular tribute as a sign of submission. Raja Abdullah, confident in his sovereignty, refused to comply. This defiance provoked the Siamese kingdom, which responded by launching a military campaign against Kelantan, eventually capturing Raja Abdullah in the conflict.

Faced with the potential collapse of her kingdom and the imprisonment of her husband, Puteri Saadong made a profoundly courageous decision. 29 Her decision was not born of fear but of strategic foresight. She recognised that personal sacrifice might prevent greater suffering and preserve the dignity of Kelantan. The Siamese king welcomed her, captivated by her intelligence and composure.

During her time in the Siamese palace, Puteri Saadong remained composed and principled. 30 As fate would have it, the Siamese king fell gravely ill. His physicians failed to restore his health, and the court fell into despair. Puteri Saadong, skilled in traditional Malay medicine, offered her assistance. Applying her knowledge with care and precision, she gradually nursed the king back to health. His recovery not only reaffirmed her status but also softened his stance toward Kelantan.

Grateful for her compassion and intellect, the Siamese king granted her freedom and permitted her to return home. Upon her arrival in Kelantan, she resumed her duties with quiet strength. 31 She continued to rule from Kota Jelasin, focusing on rebuilding and maintaining peace. Her return symbolised not only the resilience of her spirit but also the endurance of her people.

In the later years of her life, Puteri Saadong withdrew from active rule and sought spiritual retreat. She relocated to Bukit Marak, a place where she offered healing and counsel to the local community. Eventually, she journeyed to Gunung Ayam, a sacred mountain associated with mysticism and seclusion. It is said that she disappeared there, leaving no trace. 32.

Today, Puteri Saadong is remembered not only as a historical figure but also as a cultural icon. Her life illustrates the complexity of leadership, the strength of personal conviction and the depth of love for one's homeland. From the halls of Kota Jelasin to the quiet slopes of Gunung Ayam, her journey reflects the enduring values of sacrifice, wisdom and national pride. Her story continues to inspire generations, reminding us that true leadership is often defined not by power, but by selflessness and courage in the face of adversity.
